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Introduction

- b) Recognize, indicate and address crucial social-economic problems of the contemporary EU.



Summative assessment:

There is one formally assessed **individual written assignment** associated with this module. The length of this assignment will be 4000-4500 words (excluding appendices).

The final paper is an opportunity to enquire further about the topics discussed in class, but not developed in detail, or to dedicate more attention to one aspect of the course of particular interest to you. Topics should retain some connection with the course content, and with a particular class theme, and should be selected with the prior approval of the instructor. The paper may highlight a specific country, policy, problem or challenge.

Please, note that normally all assignments should contain the following parts:

- 1. An executive summary.
- 2. Content page listing and numbering all the chapters and sub-chapters.
- 3. A literature survey related to the relevant theoretical frameworks used to analyse the chosen issue.
- 4. Main body of your assignment.
- 5. Conclusions and recommendations
- 6. List of references
- 7. Appendices with the supporting statistical and other information that has been used for your critical analysis of the chosen issue.

Papers must be submitted within the indicated deadline in electronic form in Microsoft Word format.

Paper format requirements:

Page format: A4, Orientation: Portrait

Margins: Top - 2 cm, Bottom - 2 cm, Left - 3 cm, Right - 2 cm

Page numbering – bottom, centred

Font: Times New Roman, Size – 12 pt, Line Spacing – 1,5

Titles: Size – 12 pt, bold, centred

Citation: footnote, numbered from 1 to n (font size 10 pt)

Assessment criteria, including their weight in the final mark:

- 1) Critical literature review related to the chosen economic or social issue with European dimension 20% weight of the total mark
- 2) Critical review of the history, current situation and future development of the chosen economic, social or demographical problem 20% weight of the total mark
- 3) Critical Evaluation of the impact of the analysed economic, social or demographical chosen problem on EU future development 30% weight of the total mark
- 4) Appropriate & Justified Recommendations 15% weight of the total mark
- 5) Format, writing style & referencing 15% weight of the total mark
